Scene 6: Jesus is Crucified.

Sits on pew near women.

Standing at the raised cross looking at the cross until last line "Father....." then turn around to congregation.

Ensuring that verbs are emphasized. Return to seat once finished

3 slow gongs – 1 minute of silence

Facing cross – walking backwards towards front doors of church – when reach lectern turn and walk towards cross on wall – speaking while walking. Stay next to crucifix until the dramatization finishes

I looked over at Jesus and saw his face and heard his words. Something about him made me believe that there was hope for me; that I could be forgiven. Scene 7: Jesus dies on the cross.

No microphone

Sitting at foot of cross then standing. Finish with arms outstretched. Then move to front row seat.

I held my son in my arms. He was lowered down from the cross and I was able to hold him close to me. My tears washed over his face. He had often spoken to me about life and death, about success and failure. He knew he was hated by the authorities and he often told me that I would have to be strong if he died before me. Michael:

Notes:

□ Each person to hand mic to next person
 □ Speak 'slowly' into mic projecting the feeling of the character you're representing, rather than just your normal 'speaking voice' – lift head as much as possible to avoid sounding muffled
 □ Costumes – contemporary takes on our person...these are by no means compulsory – rather they are suggestive...what do you think...eg:
 □ Judas – black smart casual
 □ Ciaphius – Power suit – something that demonstrates leadership
 □ Peter – smart casual – jeans and red shirt/top
 □ Pontius Pilate – Suit? Something that demonstrates leadership
 □ The women – gentle colours/flowy?
 □ Centurion – black top and bottom (like a guard?)
 □ Thief – gardening clothes/work clothes
 □ Mary – 'Sunday' dress
